Dear Colleague:

As the baby boomers begin to reach retirement age, law enforcement is faced with a new challenge, the graying of America. In the next 30 years, over 55 million drivers over the age of 65 will be on our nation's highways. Today drivers over 70 years of age make up 10% of all licensed drivers.

In an effort to address this issue, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has developed the Older Driver Law Enforcement Training (ODLET) Program. Over the next three years, training will be provided in each of the 50 states. This will equip each state with a list of instructors to take the program to in-service officers statewide as well as their basic police academies. Along with providing the Train the Trainer program Law Enforcement Training and Resources (LETR) will also be facilitating certification of the program in each state.

Older Driver Law Enforcement Training (ODLET) instructors will learn how they can order student material for classes that they teach at no cost. Upon completion instructors will be able to discuss how the aging process affects older drivers, effective methods for interacting with and evaluating older drivers, and appropriate referral options available for older drivers.

The one-half day seminar is open to those who wish to become instructors in Older Driver Law Enforcement. In addition to law enforcement personnel, rural transit providers, and select DOT, county and city officials are targeted
